Shops at Alpha

There will soon be a new tenant for the former Syms store (currently occupied by a mattress and furniture warehouse). The owner of the shopping plaza has recently signed a long term lease with Discount Drug Mart. Renovation of the property is expected to start within the next 60 days. Included in the renovation will be a reduction in the size of that building and remodeling of the store fronts that face Alpha Drive. The landlord is also planning on aligning the driveway entrance in the plaza with that of the Kohl's drive. The new tenant is expected to be open sometime in the spring of 2010. There has also been a proposal to construct a small medical building on the northwest corner of the property.

Highland Road Pedestrian Path

After five years from plan to construction, the Highland Road pedestrian path is finally finished. It’s wonderful to see so many residents enjoying this great addition to our city. I want to again thank Congressman Steve LaTourette for securing funding through the Federal Transportation Committee which significantly helped defray the cost of this project. Congressman LaTourette is also helping us obtain funding to reconstruct Miner Road. He has accepted our request for funding and the money should be available in the fall of 2010. We will also be seeking state and county funding with hopes that the entire project can be completed with little or no city dollars. I will provide you with more information on this in future newsletters.

Street and City Signs

Hopefully you’ve noticed the new signs welcoming people to our city with our theme, “The City With Pride and Promise”. As I’m sure you’re aware, we also have a project under way to install new street signs. The new signs have a new look with bolder print and are much more visible from the roads. Currently all the signs on the main arteries have been installed. It’s our intention to install new signs on all city streets. The next section to be worked on will be all the streets off of Ridgebury Blvd in the southern most part of the city. We hope to have all signs installed throughout the city by the end of next summer.

City Council Commentary

Home Days Parade Many Thanks: This marks the 6th year that I have been the coordinator of the Home Days Parade and this year's parade was terrific thanks to volunteers of the Parade Committee: Ann D'Amico and Michael Cattichio, Linda and Rob Warner, Tom and Amy Feran, Mary Velotta, Diana Lydic, Scott Mills, and John and Patty Murphy. Several hundred residents lined the streets for this year's parade. Thanks for coming. We are always looking for committee volunteers and parade participants. Please contact me to volunteer or if you have any suggestions for next year's parade.

Jefferson Drive Sewer Relining Project Update: As I reported in the last edition of the Highlights, the County Sanitary Engineer conducted a study in the Williamsburg and Highland Road area to address storm water infiltration into sanitary sewer lines and related basement flooding along Highland Road. The County plans to move forward with a sewer relining project to address these problems. However, the project is now anticipated to begin sometime next summer, instead of this fall. The County is seeking a Water Pollution Loan for the Ohio EPA, to finance this project, estimated to cost \$250,000. The new schedule is to bid this project in early spring and begin construction in the summer of 2010. Stay tuned.

Gas Well Drilling in Our City: City Council unanimously passed a Resolution in support of a new proposed state law, drafted by State Senator Tim Grendell and NEOGAP. The legislation would ban gas well drilling in residential areas, prohibit mandatory pooling, and give us back municipal home rule to regulate drilling in commercial areas.

Shopping for Electricity

Last month we all received flyers and mailings regarding the two main electricity competitors in our area, NOPEC (Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council) and First Energy. This has led to many questions regarding the NOPEC Program.

Highland Heights is one of the 126 member communities of NOPEC. NOPEC is a nonprofit organization, whose purpose is to create "buying power" through aggregation of its member cities. Fact: NOPEC is the largest public entity aggregation in the United States, spanning 9 counties in Ohio. NOPEC negotiates both electric and gas rates for us and other member cities. Since we are a member of NOPEC, residents must decline or opt out of participating in a proposed NOPEC contract; otherwise you will be included in that plan.

In July, residents were notified that NOPEC negotiated a new contract with an independent electricity provider, GEXA, to provide electricity at reduced rates through 2010.

Under the newly negotiated NOPEC contract, the Illuminating Company will continue to deliver electricity, read your meter, and respond to emergencies, such as power outages. You will continue to receive one bill.

Many of you know that we purchased the empty church adjacent to the city hall property a couple of years ago. There was no heat or water in the building for a couple of years before we purchased it. It is in deplorable condition and after many discussions and looking into the cost of about \$800,000 to rehabilitate it back into useable shape, it seems clear that it would be best to raze the building and create green space. Part of the property may be used as a community garden site and another idea is to use some of the green space as a mini-work out station along our new pedestrian pathway similar to what you see in areas of the metro park. Department Updates

SERVICE DEPARTMENT

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE - ROUND UP - September 21 to October 3, 2009

The city will once again be conducting a household hazardous waste collection program in cooperation with the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District. Residents wishing to participate in the program may bring unwanted pesticides, household chemicals, and oil based paints to the Service Department between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, starting Monday September 21st and ending on Friday October 2nd. We will also have a one day only Saturday drop off on October 3rd from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. **Latex paint will not be accepted.** Latex paint is not considered hazardous waste. It should be dried and disposed of in a solid state. For information on drying latex paint please contact the Service Department or visit our web site. LEAF COLLECTION PROGRAM - October 12 to December 18, 2009

The Service Department plans to begin continuous curbside leaf collection on all streets beginning on October 12. Collection will be house by house and street by street. Once a cycle of all streets has been completed we will begin the cycle again. ***Please place leaves on the tree lawn for collection, not in the street.*** Leaves placed in the street can be a hazard to motorists, can block drainage and become wet and matted after a rain, which dramatically slows the collection process. Please do not mix in grass or branches with the leaves. This too slows collection. The speed of collection and the length of each cycle depend upon how much material is put out for collection, weather, and equipment availability. We therefore are unable to give you information on when we will be on any particular street. However, in general, if the weather is favorable and equipment holds up we hope to complete cycles during the heaviest part of the season in approximately 10 to 14 days. The collection program will end the second week of December to allow the Service Department time for equipment change over in preparation for snow removal operations. Residents wishing to dispose of leaves beyond the cut off date may do so by composting their leaves or bagging them (40 pounds or less) for pick up by our rubbish contractor on their regular rubbish day.

SNOW AND ICE CONTROL

The service department maintains an on-call staff available around the clock to handle snow plowing, de-icing, and any other emergencies which may arise. During non-business hours, the department relies on the police department to inform us of the need for service. Operations are prioritized by need and conditions. Main and secondary roadways are addressed first, followed by side streets, and then the clearing of walks around schools and assisting seniors with apron clearing. Anticipated shortages of road salt this past winter lead many Northeast Ohio communities to adopt ***Sensible Salting*** policies and procedures, endorsed by the Cuyahoga County Mayors and Managers Association, as a means to reduce the use of road salt and provide for the uniform treatment of road conditions throughout the county. Many of the recommendations of the plan had already been and continue to be a part of our winter maintenance strategy in Highland Heights. For reasons relating to both supply and cost, we will continue to be careful with our use of salt during the winter ahead. De-icing on most side streets will usually be limited to intersections, curves and hills at night and during extended storm periods. Once a storm has passed, side streets can be salted more thoroughly as needed.

FIRE DEPARTMENT CHIEF WILLIAM TURNER

Your home should be a safe haven. But do you regularly check for home fire hazards? If not, there is the potential for danger. Fire departments responded nationwide to nearly 400,000 home fires in 2007.

That's why the theme of Fire Prevention Week 2009 is

“It's Fire Prevention Week. Stay Fire Smart! Don't Get Burned.”

The fire station and equipment will be open for tours. Fire Department personnel will be available to answer your questions and to demonstrate services and equipment , such as:

Emergency Medical Services

Fire Suppression and Rescue
Ventilation and Extrication Equipment
Firefighter Turnout Gear

Fire Prevention - Informational brochures and handouts about smoke detectors, carbon monoxide monitors, fire safety checklists, and exit drills in the home will be available.

Fire Safety House - Kids will have the opportunity to learn about fire safety and how to exit the home in an emergency.

SMOKE DETECTORS

- Because a fire can grow so quickly, it is very important to have a working smoke detector in your home. These devices are only effective if they are working properly. Follow these simple tips to ensure that your smoke detector is working properly.
- Make sure there is a smoke detector on every floor of your home. This includes the basement.
- New homes are required to have a detector in every sleeping room and they must be interconnected.
- Test your smoke detectors monthly following the manufacturer's instructions.
- Replace your smoke detector batteries when you change your clocks in the fall on Oct. 27th. NEVER disable the batteries in your detectors.
- Detectors don't last forever. Replace your detector every 7 to 10 years.

Cell Phones

It is advantageous that your cell phones have the Highland Heights Police Department's phone number, 440-442-1221, on speed dial for 24/7 direct access to our Dispatch Center. If you dial 9-1-1 from a cell phone, the call is routed to the County's centralized dispatch center and then forwarded to the City you request, which can take valuable time. This Police phone number of 440-442-1221 is used for both emergency and non-emergency calls and can also be used for fire or paramedic services. Phone numbers of the Police Departments in cities where you work or frequently visit should also be keyed in to your cell phones.

Highland Heights Parks

Highland Heights has two great parks. The Community Park is located on Wilson Mills Road and Whiteford Park is located on Whiteford Road. Both parks are for the use and enjoyment of the residents of Highland Heights and their guests, and all residents are invited to participate in the Parks' facilities.

The Parks are open from 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 p.m.

The Police Department wants to make sure that everyone using the Parks continues to feel safe. Rules and regulations are posted, but we remind everyone that the speed limit is 10 mph and parking is in designated areas in the Community Park.

Also, it's important to remember that the Parks are open to the general public, and therefore you should always lock your car doors and hide or put valuables in your trunk. There have been instances over the summer where vehicles have been unlocked and items stolen from cars, and also some "smash and grabs" whereby the car windows have been broken and thieves grab purses, cell phones, money and electronics that were visible inside the car. These are thefts of opportunity. Don't give someone the opportunity to steal from you.

Call the Police immediately if you have an emergency or see suspicious persons, vehicles or activity in the Parks.

Curfew

Highland Heights has curfews which are in line with neighboring cities.

Children under the age of 12 years have a curfew of from dusk to dawn.

Children 12 to 15 years old have a curfew from 11:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.

Children 16 or 17 years old have a curfew from 12:00 midnight to 6:00 a.m.

2009 Flu Shot Program

Flu shots for Highland Heights senior residents and residents with chronic medical conditions.

Flu season will be here soon and once again the Cuyahoga County Board of Health and the Tri-City Consortium on Aging are partnering to keep our residents protected against influenza. Seasonal flu vaccine will be available to area residents, age 60 and over, and to persons with a chronic illness between the ages of 18 and 59.

Only Medicare Part B will be accepted for insurance for persons 65 and over. Anyone with that coverage must bring their Medicare card and it will be submitted for payment at no cost to you.

If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, (i.e., Anthem, Kaiser, etc.) you will have to pay \$30.00 at the time of the shot, but you will be given a form that you can submit to your insurance company for reimbursement.

Please bring all insurance cards with you. If you are under 65 and not on Medicare you will have to pay. Please note that at this time the Novel H1N1 vaccine is not recommended for persons over the age of 64 and will not be given at our clinics. **Only the seasonal flu vaccine will be given.**

Shots will be given Wednesday, October 21 from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. at the Highland Heights Community Center. Please call Mary Velotta at 440-461-2440 between October 5 through October 9 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to schedule an appointment.
